Bowman's Son a Prisoner.

R. A. Garnett, who has been working as a civil engineer on the Pearson-Pacheco line, called at the headquarters of the Mormons Wednesday morning and told the officials of conditions in the mountain colonies. He said that the returning rebels came into the mountain district from the north and no one there seemed to know who was the leader, or from where they had come. They were bound for the south. They appeared at the construction camp. 20 miles above Pearson, Sunday morning and took Demar Bowman, son of Enrique C. Bowman, a prisoner, and made him accompany them toward the south. Garnett says that he and his partner escaped and came to Pearson a short distance ahead of the rebels and that he did not know what had happened to the Mormon boys at the Colonia Pacheco ranches.

He said that bands of the rebels were riding through the mountain district and that they went to El Rucio, 12 kilometers above Pearson. Tuesday morning, according to the reports brought to Pearson by the friendly Mexicans. One of these Mexicans had been sent to the construction camp to learn what they intended to do with young Bowman and returned with the report that he was being well cared for, but would be held. Garnett says that the rebels told the Americans to get out as they intended to "put the fear of God in the gringoes."

He said that when the Mexican teamsters were driving down 60 head of mules to Pearson to prevent them being taken, the federals in Pearson fired on them, killing two mules and one of the Mex-teans.

Rebels Pleniful.

The federals and rebels are all mixed up in the Casas Grandes valley. The Pearson federals have had their scout out and have been expecting an attack from the Pacheco rebels hourly, so when they saw two Americans and a Mexican coming down the mountain road, the federals opened fire and killed the Mexican and his mule, but the two Americans ran and escaped.

George W. Kitchen, employed at the Booker camp, was one of the Americans in the party fired upon. He has arrived in El Paso.

Colony Boys Missing.
Ten or 15 Garcis and Pacheco Mormon boys and 10 from Colonia Chuichupa are in the mountains hunting cattle. Some uneasiness is felt for their safety, as they have not been heard from directly. However, they know the mountains well and if the resident natives did not tell their companion rebels in arms where the boys panion rebels in arms where the boys were, they could escape. If their plans were successful, they should have had 500 or 500 head of cattle ready to ship yesterday and they may be in today.

There are cattle in the stockyards at Colonia Dublan and it is thought they are milk cows ready to be loaded and shipped from Dublan and Juarez.

#### SYLVIAN KAYSER IS FOUND DEAD

Coroner Renders a Verdict of Suicide and Says a Note Was Left by Deceased.

Sylvain J. Kayser, known as "Toots." brother of cashier Edgar Kayser, of the First National hank, was found dead at 206 Texas street Wednesday afternoon. He had been missing since Monday and a search has been in progress for him since that time.

Kayser was employed at the James A. Dick company and was born and reared in El Paso. His father and mother, Mr. and Mrs. H. Kayser, live in El Paso.

Coroner E. B. McClintock made an examination of the body after it was found Wednesday afternoon. He pronounced it a suicide and said that a bottle of morphine was found in the room and that the deceased left a letter addressed to the public, the contents of which were not given out.

Kayser is said to have rented the room Monday evening and nothing had been seen or heard of him since. A search was made for him in Juarez and in El Paso by the pelice and private detectives but no trace of him was found until his body was discovered in the rooming house.

He was a graduate of the El Paso High school and was a few years ago a carrier boy for the El Paso Herald.
